Our Rotary Foundation named World's Outstanding Foundation

The US Association of Fundraising Professionals' (AFP) annual awards programme recognises outstanding achievement by individual, foundation and corporate philanthropists, fundraising volunteers and fundraising professionals.

In philanthropy, such individuals and organizations form a vital partnership with charities and the nonprofit sector to ensure that the needs of all citizens are met. It is right and proper, therefore, that AFP honors those who hold high ethical standards and best exemplify commitment and dedication toward helping society.



AFP selected our Rotary Foundation as its 2017 Outstanding Foundation and the Foundation was honoured at its International Fundraising Conference in San Francisco, at the end of April. AFP felt honoured that our Chairman of Trustees, Kalyan Banerjee, answered their questions about the Foundation, its impact and what's ahead.

The following were Kalyan's key responses.

Our focus is decided by analysing the types of projects Rotary members have been historically involved in and where they have made the biggest impacts. Since members seemed to naturally focus on literacy, empower youth, enhance health, promote peace and advance communities, it made sense to formally adopt these as our Areas of Focus.

Eradicating polio is Rotary's main focus. Rotary members are dedicated to ridding the world of this disabling disease and have volunteered their time and collectively donated over \$1.6 billion since we launched our PolioPlus initiative in 1985.

The world is now 99.9 percent polio-free, with more than 2.5 billion children immunized. While that is amazing news and we are on the cusp of a polio free world, we still have work to do.

Our grant model simplified the Foundation's grant process and focuses Rotary members service efforts where they will have the greatest impact. The model is innovative in combining Rotary's volunteer base and a global reach with local resources to support sustainable, high-impact results in communities all over the world. The Foundation funds more than US\$100 million in service projects and scholarships annually.

Our Peace Centers have trained more than 1,000 peace fellows. These graduates are leaders who often go on to become catalysts for peace and conflict prevention and resolution in their communities and across the globe. Many of them serve as leaders in national governments, NGOs, the military, law enforcement and international organizations like the United Nations and World Bank.

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People want to see the results of their philanthropic giving. It is no longer enough to know that their funds are being handled with care. Donors want to know that their funds are invested in projects and activities that will have a tangible impact in improving people's lives. Global grants fund effective projects that achieve their goals within the Foundation's six areas of focus.

Our Foundation needs you!

There are two main sources of funding for our Foundation for the projects where Rotarians are "doing good in the World". As Rotarians well know, these are the Annual Programme Fund (APF) and End Polio Now (EPN).

Rotary Global Projects and District Grant Projects are dependent on the financing that Rotarians undertake and contribute to these funds.

We have many good ideas and schemes, including personal dona-

tions, to ensure we can, in service above self, achieve world understanding and peace in our vision of a better world.

However, this year, it appears, funding efforts to APF are drifting and contributions are not matching the generous giving of previous years.

There is the awareness that many of our clubs do not forward their giving until the Rotary Year end but **23rd June** is the key date to enable Foundation to reconcile the giving for the year.

Do you have funds in reserve? Please help by ensuring that your contributions are made by **23**rd **June** and, perhaps, you can find that little extra to support our Annual F und. The table shows that to match the generous giving of last year, incidentally the best year you achieved in the last nine years, would need a contribution of **£532,361 + 1** to surpass our previous efforts.

Roger was both delighted and embarrassed to be told by the members present that RIBI President Eve had mentioned his efforts at RIBI Conference on the Sunday morning.

Roger is typical of the hard core of Rotarians who work conscientiously behind the scenes without seeking thanks, acknowledgement, or reward. In his Club his strengths and reliability are sought out frequently and he rightly carries his PHF because of the respect of his peers.

Roger joined Rotary in 1978. He was running a hugely successful printing company and was active (including president) in its trade associations. Because of the pressures of work, in the early days, his Rotary efforts were directed to service rather than office —bearing and this approach has continued to this day. Thus, he is now Manchester's bulletin editor; attendance secretary; reception coordinator; fellowship convenor; garden-party host; and first in line if anything out of ordinary needs doing. In short — your perfect Rotarian: a pillar of the community but shrinking from the limelight.

Asked about the speed at which he returned his money/ cheque filled jar, Roger replied

"I took the jar home and Christine and I ate it! (Ed hopes Roger is referring to the contents and not the glass!). I washed it out and walked down the lane knocking at doors and distributing the PURPLE4POLIO leaflets. Purple Polio

Since the initiative to eradicate polio worldwide, the number of polio-endemic countries has dropped from 125 to just 3, with over 2.5 billion children receiving



the vaccinations thank to the help of Rotary. As you will be aware, with eradication now closer than ever, Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland has created the Purple4Polio campaign as part of the final push to eradicate polio for good.

There are many local funding raising events taking place under the Purple4Polio banner, but the Rotary Club of Huntly, with the help of Rizzas's & Sons Ltd a local ice cream producer, have developed a blueberry flavoured purple ice-cream. The ice cream has been manufactured in 2 sizes – 125ml and 1 litre cartons - with the proceeds of all sales going to Rotary's "End Polio Now" campaign; every 125ml and 1 litre carton sold, enables 1 and 6 polio immunisations.

The Purple4Polio ice cream is now available throughout the whole of the UK and Ireland via a network of distributors, details of whom can be found at: https://www.rotarygbi.org/what-we-do/purple4polio/ice-cream/

When a Rotary Club buys the ice cream, the contribution towards immunisation has already been included in the buying price. However, any profit that a Rotary Club makes by selling the ice cream at more than the recommended selling price (£1.75 for 125ml and £4.50 for 1 litre) could then go towards that Club's End Polio Now contribution.



So, why not consider ordering some for an event where you could sell to ice cream, or perhaps asking your catering staff to order some for your charity dinners, charter nights, etc. By doing so you are not only supporting the final push to eradicate polio, but you will be also enjoying some great ice cream.
